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We are in the midst of one of the busiest times of the year, Christmas. Stores have been playing Christmas music since the first of October. Even Christmas trees and decorations have been on display since the end of September. For several months Social media has been full of folks posting pictures of the Christmas decorations they had *already* put up. The closer the day draws, the busier we all become as the holiday consumes our every thought and deed.

But what is Christmas really all about? What is the truth hidden behind all of the shopping, lights, trees, decorations, and festivities? Churches will put on their annual Christmas pageants with the singing of carols, children dressed up as Biblical characters, cute little dramatic plays, all closed out with a few words from the Pastor. But is this really what Christmas is all about?

Now I am not advocating the cancellation of Christmas, the end of church pageants, nor the blackout of lights and decorations; although it must be admitted that the latter has less than spiritual beginnings. The celebration of Christmas is a purely man-made holiday and never advocated in Scripture.

While God had promised (Gen. 3:15) and the prophets spoke (Isa. 7:14; 9:6-7; 11:1) of the coming Redeemer, the real and full significance was veiled in mystery. Nowhere do the writers of Scripture speak of any celebration of the birth recorded in Matthew 1:18-25 and expanded upon in Luke 1:26-56; 2:1-20. In fact, immediately following Jesus' birth the Scriptures transfer to the early ministry of John the Baptist. We really hear

little more of Jesus until His presentation in the Temple at age 12 and then not again until He begins His public ministry and is baptized at age 30. It ought to be shocking to some that so little time is spent on the birth of this long-anticipated One. The prophets had written of His links to Israel, the Tribe of Judah, His birth in Bethlehem and the fact that it was all linked to a virgin who conceived, and yet, the night He was born there was no room for his family in the Inn.

But you see, folks, the birth of Christ is significant only in that it was through this event that God entered into this world in the flesh (Jn. 1:14). The angelic host had an inkling of the great purpose of His appearance when they declared at His birth, "...Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David, a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." And "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, goodwill toward men!" (Lk. 2:10-11; 14)

But the great and *full significance* of this birth continued to be veiled in mystery, as the ministry of John the Baptist was limited to the Nation of Israel and Jesus Himself in sending forth the disciples instructed them, "...Go not into the way of the Gentiles, and into any city of the Samaritans enter ye not: but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." (Mt. 10:5-6) And why was this? Hear Jesus' own words; "...I am not sent but unto the lost sheep of the house of Israel." (Mt. 15:24)

That veil of secrecy would not be lifted until the Apostle Paul had received the revelation of



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the mystery and would begin to preach Christ in a whole new light. "Now to Him that is of power to establish you according to my gospel and the preaching of Jesus Christ according to the revelation of the mystery, which was kept secret since the world began...." (Rom. 16:25) And, thus, the Apostle would write; "...that Jesus Christ came into the world to save sinners." (1 Tim. 1:15b) And, of course, he had established who that was when he had received and penned Romans 3:23, "For all [Jew and Gentile] have sinned and come short of the glory of God."

The real significance of the Christmas season is not seen at His birth but, rather, in why He had come: to die, to be buried and to rise again as the full and complete payment for the sins of the world. To accomplish this, it would be necessary for Jesus Christ to lay down His own life, shed His own blood and die. (Heb. 9:22) But it was not enough to simply shed His blood and die. First, He had to become sin, to have the sins of the world imputed to Him (that the sin of the world was taken and placed upon the Son). The Father "made Him sin for us." (2 Cor. 5:19-21) This was so agonizing to the Son, so contrary to what, and Who the Son was that the Father turned His face and the Lord would cry out, "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Mt. 27:46) The price of sin, the price of my sin, the price of your sin, was placed upon the Son and He willingly laid down His life, shed His blood, and paid the cost.

The writer John records that God "...so loved the world that He gave..." (Jn. 3:16). The Apostle Paul would write along similar lines of God's love and Christ's sacrificial work: "But God commendeth His love toward us, in that, while were yet sinners, Christ died for us." (Rom. 5:8) This faithfulness on the part of Christ to the

redemptive plan of the Father is seen in the faithfulness of Christ spoken of in Romans 3:22: "Even the righteousness of God which is by faith of Jesus Christ unto all and upon all them that believe...." Christ had prayed that the cup of iniquity could pass from Him, but then He uttered those great words of faithfulness, "...nevertheless not as I will, but as thou wilt." (Mt. 26:39)

Here we see the great love of the Father and the faithfulness of the Son united in the cause of Redemption. God's great love for the world will cost Him the life of His Son. And this, my friends, is the true reason for the season. The greatest gift ever given to man was the man Christ Jesus Who came into the world for the purpose of laying down His life to pay the full price of Sin.

As we enter this festive time of the year with the business of the season, the laughter and parties, the family gatherings and festivities, let us not forget that the reason we celebrate is the willing act of redemption carried out by that babe born in that lowly manger, that One Who was born to die. Christmas is a time filled with love, but it was the love of God, demonstrated through His son that paid the terrible cost.

As we celebrate, let us not forget the real reason for the celebration that the gift of life made available to all who, by belief, place their faith and trust in the finished work of Christ; His death, burial and resurrection. Have you taken that step of faith? Do have a relationship with the Father through the Son? I can think of no greater time than right now to take that simple step of believing faith and trust Christ and His finished work on your

behalf, and Christ alone. =

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
